



Tennessee Traditional Flies

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
Zug Bug Jig

April - September

Hook: Daiichi 4647 10-16
Bead: Slotted Tungsten Gold 5/32 size 12
Lead Wire .020 4-5 turns size 12
Thread: Veevus 10/0 Black
Tail: Peacock Sword
Ribbing: Veevus Small Gold Oval Tinsel
Body: Peacock Herl
Wing: Wood Duck Flank
Hackle: Brown Hen Hackle

Step: 1 Mount hook with bead in the vise.



Step: 2 Add six wraps of lead free wire




Step: 3 Start thread just behind the lead free wire



Step: 4 Cover the lead free wire with thread



Step: 5 Build a thread dam behind the lead free wire and wrap thread back to the bend of the hook.



Step: 6 Attach three peacock swords just at the end of the thread.



Step: 7 Wrap thread up to the lead free wire and trim tag.



Step: 8 Attach French Tinsel just behind the lead free wire on the outside of the abdomen.



Step: 9 Attach five pieces of peacock herl just behind the lead free fire.




Step: 10 Wrap thread back to the tail




Step: 11 Wrap thread back to the bead and flip the hook.



Step: 12 Prep hackle




Step: 13 Attach hackle just behind the bead.



Step: 14 Position the hackle on top of the hook shank.



Step: 15 Secure the feather with several wraps of thread and trim tag.




Step: 16 Wrap the thread back to the end of the lead free wire. Create a thread loop




Step: 17 Wrap the loop to the tail with thread.



Step: 18 Wrap the thread back up to the bead.



Step: 19 Twist peacock herl with the thread loop.



Step: 20 Wrap the peacock herl up to just behind the Bead.



Step: 21 Tie off the peacock herl and trim the tag.



Step: 22 Counter wrap the tinsel to just behind the bead.



Step: 23 Tie off the tinsel and trim the tag.



Step: 24 Prep hackle tie in



Step: 25 Tie in the hackle at the prepared tie in.



Step: 26 Pull back the hackle and secure the hackle




Step: 27 Pull back the hackle fibers while wrapping the hackle.



Step: 28 Wrap one complete wrap of the hackle.



Step: 29 Tie off the hackle with the thread and trim the tag



Step:30 Pull back and hold down the first piece of hackle and wrap it with thread so it points back.



Step: 31 whip finish collar and cement.
